

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) Education has been hailed as the way forward for years in American academic circles. Recently though, a new letter has been added to the acronym accounting for STEAM Education (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics.) The inclusion of Arts into the prescribed curriculum standards has been embraced at Cardinal Mooney.

The Cardinal Mooney Visual Arts Department, headed by Mr. Sean Butler ('85) offers a vast array of courses rooted in fundamentals and progressing through Advanced Placement opportunities. Each student at CMHS must complete one full credit in the Arts in order to graduate from CMHS. This requirement is satisfied through a variety of options. Through this experience, students garner the creative skills so crucial in implementing the more analytical aspects of STEM. For example, in order for an engineer to successfully execute a design or for a surgeon to complete a proce-

dure, they must be able to conceptualize the physical aspects of their goal. This is where the Arts can be critical. Beginning with Art I, CMHS students begin their mastery of sketching, sculpture and painting. Similarly, **Mrs. Maureen Kandray's Photogra-phy courses** explore real-life aspects of dimension and the interconnectivity of forms. STEM professionals must be able to articulate their vision; CMHS Arts are the first step.

However, the Arts at Mooney are also an invaluable source of self-expression. Students are called upon to translate their emotions and observations into swirling swaths of color or detailed portraits of their heroes. Technology increasingly enters into the Arts courses. Mr. Butler and Mrs. Kandray routinely utilize Apple computers, Photoshop and Wacom tablets in their Digital Photography and 3-D Art classes. Further courses in the Arts series allow students to enhance their skills and explore new media.

Unique to Mooney is the AP Art Course. This is an intense course in which students create five quality pieces in any medium and twelve breadth pieces in one concentra-



tion with a common theme. The pieces are then sent to an evaluation board and assessed according to the AP guidelines. Students are thus, essentially, afforded an opportunity to become juried artists early in their careers. The evidence is clear that STEAM Education is one of the most well-rounded academic advantages that students can experience. At CMHS we put that education into action with Cardinal Mooney Visual Arts, not only bringing joy to our darkest winters but inspiring creativity in our daily lives!

American Scholars Group: One Student's Story

Like most Freshmen, Angela Peng was nervous to start high school. However, while

most students worry about with whom they will eat lunch and whether or not they'll be able to find their classes, Angela has had bigger fears. She had just relocated 8,000 miles from her hometown of Chong Quing, a city of over 30 million people in Southern China, to Youngstown, Ohio to start her high school career at Cardinal Mooney.

Angela found Cardinal Mooney through the American Scholars Group, an educational consulting company based in Greenville, Pennsylvania that matches international students looking to study abroad with American high schools. With a brother already studying Business at college in New York, Angela knew she wanted to have a similar experience, but one that was more closely related to her interests than the options in China. "In China," Angela explains, "there is a lot of emphasis on math. I prefer to study language and had an interest in improving my English. So my parents contacted ASG and once they visited Cardinal Mooney, they knew that it would be a good fit for me." That "good fit" included an individualized study track for Angela that allowed her to further explore English courses and the Arts. One of her favorite classes has been Dr. Mattiussi's History of the Catholic Church. Angela appreciates the ways in which Dr. Mattiussi challenges his students to examine the origins of the Church and debate their views in class.

As a Cardinal, Angela lives in an ASG dorm in Struthers, Ohio with eighteen other international students who also attend Mooney, including girls from China, Korea, and Vietnam. For a time, Angela stayed close to her dorm, giving in to her insecurities. However, this year, her Junior year, Angela made an effort to branch out and states that she couldn't be happier! This year, she has expanded her friend group to include more American students, including **Junior Alana Bowser**. The two of them, along with a close-knit group of other Juniors, spend their weekends shopping, going to the movies, and enjoying dinner at Mizu Japanese Restaurant. Of course, they also make sure to cheer on the Cardinals at Mooney sporting events! A highlight of her life at Mooney has been the extracurricular opportunities, including Art Club, Yearbook and YES Fest.

Angela's Chinese name is Liyun which means "pretty cloud." Much like her name, Angela has the abilities and confidence after her time at Mooney to travel far and wide in her pursuits. She hopes to study Business and Economics at UCLA after her graduation next year. Perhaps, she thinks, she might work in International Business, splitting her time between China and the United States. Wherever she goes, Angela can be sure that her Mooney Family will be supporting her!

When asked what sets Cardinal Mooney apart from other area high schools, there are as many answers as there are members of the Mooney Family. From athletics, to lifelong friendships, to those famous cookies in our cafeteria, nearly everyone has one thing that they hold dear. However, upon closer inspection, most of those familiar with the unique Mooney Way will undoubtedly cite the school's Block Scheduling as the outstanding aspect of their high school experience. What is this Block Scheduling? How and why did Mooney institute this unique way of course arrangement? What exactly are the benefits of "the Block" as it's called?

In 1999, "the Block" was instituted at Cardinal Mooney out of a necessity. Traditionally, over 98% of Mooney graduates go on to college. These students were looking for a way to secure an academic advantage over their peers. Thus, in the late 1990s a group of Mooney Administrators led by then Assistant Principal Jim Cooney set out on a three-year quest to find out the best way to accommodate more in-depth academics at the school without tacking on extra hours to each day. It was determined after an exhaustive examination of other high-achieving Ohio high schools that a daily schedule consisting of four classes, each 90 minutes long, (as opposed to the traditional six or seven 45-minute classes at many other schools) was the best solution. Mooney students earn 8 credits per year under this system— which changes class schedules either at the quarter or semester. At the first semester's conclusion in January four full credits are awarded to students, and four additional credits are awarded at the end of the second semester in June. Semester-long courses are core subjects, including Math, Science, English and Foreign Language among others. Quarter-length courses tend to be of the elective variety, such as Photography, Business, Forensic Science, and those specially chosen by students to explore their individual interests. Mooney graduates receive 311/2 credits versus the 271/2 at traditional high schools.

Prior to the installation of the Block, teachers attended an in-service on how best to engage students in learning for 90 minutes. While college-level courses tend to stretch out for longer periods, high schoolers need consistent engagement to retain their interest.



Hence, faculty were educated in varying teaching styles and strategies on how to maximize the extended periods, such as changing instructional strategies up to three times per class period. Often, a teacher will follow a pattern of traditional instruction, implementation of skills through a lab or in-class exercise, then a reinforcement lesson.

The benefits of Block Scheduling are varied. While students have the opportunity to earn more credits, thus putting them at a competitive and academic advantage in college admissions, there is also a reverence for more content and personalized educational methodologies. Students have more one-on-one time with teachers whereby they can receive immediate intervention. Additionally, with only four classes per day, students have less homework in fewer courses, allowing time for

extracurricular involvement. Science classes, in particular, thrive under the Block, with ample time to complete an instructional lesson and active lab within the same class period. Photography and other Arts courses allow for students to fully complete their artistic vision in one sitting rather than interrupting their process. With an extended 90-minute period, the Mooney Service Class is able to travel off-campus to assist at local nursing homes and elementary schools on a daily basis.

Current Social Studies Department Head Mr. Jim Jablonski thoroughly enjoys teaching within the Block. **Mr. Jablonski** ('98) teaches a range of courses from American Government to AP Psychology. He states that with the extended class time, he is able to bring current events discussions into his government and history courses, allowing for students to debate ideas and examine the similarities of the human condition over the centuries. Mr. Jablonski states, "with Block Scheduling, I feel that the students are able to receive a well-rounded educational experience. The extra time lets us move beyond rote memorization. We aren't teaching for the test, but instead we are developing a thought process that prepares kids for academics beyond the high school level. This is particularly important in the challenging AP classes, where students earn college credit while still in high school. The content with these courses requires a high level of dedication to the subject at hand. The Block is a necessity."



Generations of Cardinals have stories of Mr. Cooney's legendary ability to draw a perfect circle without looking or a word of encouragement from the former educator that sticks with them to this day. Few members of the Mooney Family evoke such respect as Mr. Cooney. With 46 years as a member of the faculty and Administration, he continues to serve the school as a member of the Board. After earning a BA from the Athenaeum in Cincinnati and an MA in Education from Xavier Unversity,

Sustaining the Mission Through Scholarships

When superstar Georgia attorney E. Jewelle Johnson ('90) was looking for a way in which to best support her alma mater, she knew that she wanted to accomplish two things. Initially, she wanted to make sure that current students had the opportunity to benefit from the Mooney Way. She also wanted to pay homage to her mother, the woman that helped support Jewelle's own way through Mooney and beyond. To accomplish these goals, Jewelle established the Lizzie L. Johnson Scholarship at Cardinal Mooney to assist students.

Recipients of this scholarship must meet the following criteria:

- An African-American student residing in the 44507 zip code
- A cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better
- A minimum of 25 volunteer hours in the local community within the prior year

It is clear when looking at Jewelle's impressive post-Mooney life why she would want to ease access to education for others. Jewelle earned both her Bachelor of Philosophy and Bachelor of Arts degrees from Miami University in Oxford, Ohio in 1994. She graduated with her



A recipient of numerous awards, including the State Bar of Georgia's Commitment to Equality Award, Jewelle was appointed by Georgia Governor Nathan Deal to the State of Georgia's Employee Benefits Plan Council and the State Personnel Board. She also serves as a Director on the Boards of the National Employment Law Council and the Care and Counseling Centers of Georgia — as well as sitting on the planning committee for the 2018 Women, Influence & Power in Law Conference. She served as a prior President of the Georgia Association of Black Women Attorneys (GABWA). Jewelle's other leadership activities have included the Georgia Supreme Court's Commission on Access and Fairness in the Courts, the State Bar of Georgia Committee to Promote Inclusion in the Profession, the Atlanta Legal Aide Society's Advisory Committee, the Fulton County Chapter of the Metropolitan Atlanta Boys and Girls Clubs, the Atlanta Business League, and the Atlanta Legal Diversity Consortium.



What prompted you to establish a scholarship at CMHS?

I started the scholarship in honor of my mother, Lizzie L. Johnson. She was a huge proponent of education in general and Cardinal Mooney in particular. She believed, and I agree, that the quality of the education at Mooney set the stage for me to be successful as an attorney and as a citizen of the world. As a result, she was very supportive of the school, and I could think of no better way to honor her memory and the sacrifices she made for me than to reach back and help others experience all that Mooney has to offer.



Students' Future

How did Mooney help prepare you for life after Graduation?

Mooney helped transform me from a shy, introverted child who would refrain from reading an announcement over the loudspeaker into an athlete, a performer and an advocate. As a result of the academic programs at Mooney, I was extremely prepared for college and able to succeed in a competitive environment with people from across the globe. However, the extracurricular activities were just as impactful. I played basketball, sang in the chorus, performed in theatrical productions, and participated in Student Council, the speech team and Physics Club. All of these activities allowed me to develop wonderful relationships with people of different ethnic and socio-economic backgrounds and to challenge myself in various ways while maintaining and reinforcing the Christian values with which I had been raised. I was voted Most Likely to Succeed my Senior year at Mooney, and I have always used that as part of my inspiration to live up to the potential that my classmates saw in me.

Why should someone give to Mooney?

Cardinal Mooney is a lighthouse in the raging storm. It is a place where students can develop their talents in a safe environment with teachers who are truly vested in their success and an academic program that will more than prepare them for college. It is an institution that instills Christian and moral values and gives children the gift of opportunity. The sports program is outstanding, and not just with respect to football (though you cannot help but love Mooney football), but also tennis, track, volleyball, baseball and basketball. More than anything, Mooney is family. I moved away from Youngstown after college and rarely return. However, I remain connected to classmates who are successful and thriving and who would be there for me if ever the need arose. My goddaughters, who are 20 years younger than me, both graduated from Mooney and love the school as much as I do. We still sing the Mooney Fight Song. There is no generational divide with the Mooney experience because the spirit of Mooney truly never, ever dies.

Cardinal Mooney is extremely grateful for E. Jewelle Johnson's generosity toward our school. We look to others to follow her example and establish a scholarship to make to make it possible for deserving students to attend Mooney.
